Despite the chaos, I remember the trip fondlyespecially looking out at Denver under a full moon from Red Rocks Amphitheater.

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



Kayak Cruise


If Minnesota is the land of 10,000 lakes it would be wrong not to use them at least once a year.

Porzana Brunch






